


















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There is a no drop-off policy on the academy site. We encourage all who travel by car to drop off at a nearby road which is a short walk from the academy.

Remembrance Sunday 13th November 2016

Respect and remembrance were at the heart of every Ormiston Denes Academy student this week, in the year that marks the centenary of the death of Sgt Claud Castleton, one of our alumni, who gallantly gave his life at the Battle of the Somme and, in so doing, earned a posthumous Victoria Cross.

Students Lauren and Hubert played a lead role in our commemorations, actively involved in delivering assemblies to every student in the academy over the week. They were also proud to represent the academy at memorial services held in Lowestoft on Friday and on Sunday, forging important and impressive links with our local community.

In front of local dignitaries and many hundreds of armed forces, members of the British Legion, cadets, scouts, guides, a plethora of other organisations and members of the public, Lauren read the poem, "Why Do I Wear A Poppy?" by Anne Starr. Her poignant words were well received, and she was particularly taken by the lyrics from the poem: "I wear it for the fallen, and those falling still."

Hubert read "In Flanders Fields" and said he felt it "was a privilege to make a contribution to the



whole event" and to mark the anniversary of Sgt Castleton.
Former Head Girl, Nabila, laid a wreath on behalf of staff and students from the academy for the second year, and she said it was "an honour to come back and pay respects to those who fought for

us." She added that it was "important that everyone in the community recognises the contribution and sacrifice made by service men and women."



This has become a tradition for students from Ormiston Denes Academy, and many members of the local community were keen to speak with our students and staff during and after the event to praise them for the quality of their reading, and for the respect that they showed.

Mr Bown, Vice Principal, said: "our students are excellent ambassadors for the academy today. It is so important that young people understand the importance of Remembrance, and the work that our student voice has led in the academy this week has made me very proud indeed."

Councillor Nick Webb, Mayor of Lowestoft, and Mark Bee, Chairman of Waveney District Council, were amongst those to thank our students for their excellent contributions to the service.

Ray attended The Denes from 2011 to 2014. Ray was, and still is, a very proactive student. Whilst studying at The Denes he was also Head Boy, and was Chair of Waveney Youth Council. We have recently caught up with Ray, and this is what he told us:

School life

"I have always held very fond memories of being a student at Ormiston Denes and it always has been a pleasure to return and catch up with familiar faces.

Ormiston Denes was where the academic foundations which underpinned my studies at A-Levels and university were first developed, and it was opportunities at The Denes which led to my subsequent interest in youth social action. I remain very grateful for all the support, advice and encouragement from my teachers and support staff, especially Ms Mayo, throughout my time at The Denes which helped me to take the first steps towards where I am now.

As a student, I have witnessed a lot of changes; abolition of middle schools, conversion into an academy and introduction of vertical tutor groups to name a few. What did not change for me however was the fantastic commitment from staff to see their students succeed.

Now at university, I do miss the routine nature of daily life whilst at school. However, there were some particular occasions which stood out, for example, the two mysteries during Year 11 which remain unsolved to this day. The case of Miss Westoby's (now Mrs Sutton) missing rock in Geography, and the case of my missing French book, which disappeared just before my final controlled assessment containing all my notes. Despite whole school search efforts, it remains unfound. Please get in touch if anyone ever comes across it!

Together with Head Girl Edie, Project Lead Nathan, and a team of over 100, along with Mr Ainslie and Ms Mayo, we championed views of our peers and enabled students to engage with all aspects of academy life; from interviewing staff candidates, including four heads of houses, to providing logistical support to public events.

For some of us the latter often resulted in 13 hour days, but they were great fun. A receipt for some pizza ordered before the school production addressed to "Osmartin Beans Academy, Yourmouth Road" provoked particular hilarity, although I doubt the finance department found it quite as amusing when we had to hand it in ...!

It was challenging to run a very active Student Leadership whilst studying 10 subjects, a common sight back then was a stressed me rushing around the corridors delivering memos. Looking back, I often thought that perhaps my job title should have been "postman" instead of anything else.... However, the transferable skills I gained; time management, prioritising, and leadership have served me well

The highlight of my tenure was the development of the very popular, very successful Community Bakery Project which involved visiting care homes to share cakes and scones with the elderly.

After The Denes

I studied five A/S subjects and four A-Levels at East Norfolk Sixth Form College before successfully securing a place at Imperial College London to study medicine.

Outside of my studies, I went on to the Waveney Youth Council, working with schools and partners to develop youth-led projects including the nationally award-winning Transition Ambassador Project, delivered in eight schools and colleges, including Ormiston Denes. I also serve as a board member for the East Suffolk Partnership of local authorities and service providers, ensuring youth input into local high-level decision making.

My message to current students

Keep aspiring and always challenge yourself. Believe that you can succeed if you are prepared to put in the hard work; take the initiative and don't just get on with it, but stick with it. Of course, there will be momentary setbacks, challenges and difficulties along the way, but try to keep in mind the bigger picture of where you want to go. Never give up, ask for help, seek advice, and make the most of every opportunity available. I wish everyone all the best for the future."

"Out of the 40 teams competing, our team won which was no more than what my teammates deserved for their hard work throughout the process.

"UCFB for me has and continues to be a unique experience that wholeheartedly appeals to individuals who aspire to operate within the sports industry.

"Our course 'Football Business & Media' was redesigned over the Summer break and I have loved the new course spec to date and would recommend anyone who is interested in sports media, especially those who love football, to take this course.

"Nial Quinn, George Cohen, Clarke Carlisle, Nick Hewer & Sky Sports presenter Hayley McQueen have all been guest speakers so far this year. All have been very interesting and insightful."

Year 10 Work Experience Monday 3rd - Friday 7th July 2017

- Work experience gives young people the opportunity of involvement in a workplace, helping them to understand how the world of work operates and how it differs to school. For many students this will be their first chance to work in an adult working environment, and an opportunity to show their potential. It can increase confidence, further develop employability skills and bring the curriculum to life by showing how subjects can be applied and valued in the workplace.

Students have until 17th March 2017 to find their own placements, using the peach forms which were in their launch packs.


Warhammer School League

All Year 9 Arts Award students pass their Bronze Arts Award

Arts Award is an accredited qualification from Trinity College London, "inspiring young people to grow as artists and arts leaders, inspiring them to connect with and take part in the wider arts world through challenges in an art form" – artsaward.org.uk

Students had to produce a portfolio of work relating to the titles of Explore, Event, Inspiration and Presentation. Over the course of a year, students created a wide variety of artwork using different media and techniques (Explore). Additionally, they visited The Sainsbury Centre in Norwich, where they enjoyed tours and artist-led workshops (Event), and researched artists who inspired their work (Inspiration). Finally, they had to learn a new art skill and present this as an information leaflet to teach someone else (Presentation).

All 41 students received their Bronze Award.

Miss Amy Barwood, Art Technician, said: "The course involved a lot of hard work and we, as a department, are incredibly proud of what these students have achieved, especially since this was our first year running the course."



National Youth Takeover Day

Ormiston Denes Academy recently participated in the Childrens' Commissioner's National Youth Takeover Challenge, an event which sees organisations opening their doors to children and young people to take over adult roles. It puts students in decision-making positions, and allows them to gain an insight into the world of work and challenges that adults face.

This year, working with Waveney Youth Council, Waveney District Council and East Coast Community Healthcare members, groups of students from schools across Waveney were put in charge of the local Clinical Commissioning Group budget for a 5 year period, and tasked with making budgetary decisions based on 12 'newsflash' scenarios and three options to choose from with each scenario. The project was very kindly funded by Waveney District Council, with prizes funded by the Council, Sentinel Leisure and East Coast Community Healthcare.

The activity gave a real insight into the work that goes into buying healthcare services, the various types of healthcare services, and some of the serious decisions that have to be made regarding budgets when unexpected events take place. Some of the scenarios were based on actual events that have taken place and caused dramatic impact on budgets.

As well as thinking about budgets, it also caused lots of debates, conversations and reasoning as to the impacts various cuts may have, and the seriousness of such cuts. For each scenario students had to mark their changes in budget areas, detail the new budgets, provide justification as to their option decision and discuss the impact of their decisions.

Students then had to discuss various scenarios with a panel, made up of health care professionals, local councillors and council members, and even our local MP joined the panel. Each group was judged on the reasoning behind their decisions, the outcomes of those decisions, and their presentation and enterprise skills used during the day.

Another aspect of the day was a presentation about the vast array of career options within the health sector, along with training and apprenticeship route options. This enlightened our students as they automatically considered the 'common' vocations such as doctors and nurses, but hadn't considered the other range of jobs within the service, from admin to IT, from engineers to solicitors; the range was vast. This also gave students the time to network with employees within the healthcare industry to find out more information about the work that they undertake.

All students had a really good day, with some fantastic discussions taking place. It gave the students a real opportunity to work on

a 'real life' project, and to enhance their enterprise skills such as team work, communication, problem solving, risk management and presentation skills. It also gave them an insight into the broad range of careers within this sector.



Wear it Pink

Every year, Wear It Pink raises around £2 million during Breast Cancer Awareness Month for the UK's largest breast cancer charity, Breast Cancer Now. They use the money raised to fund world-class breast cancer researchers across the UK and Ireland, who work together to discover how to prevent breast cancer, how to detect it earlier and how to treat it effectively at every stage to try and stop the disease taking lives.



In support of the charity, on Thursday 20th October 2016 we held a non-uniform day, encouraging students to wear at least one item of pink for a donation to the charity. A bake sale was also held at break time, with lots of delicious cakes and biscuits on sale. Finally, during lunchtime students could pay a donation to watch the student karaoke session which took place in our assembly hall, with a number of students bravely performing on stage in front of their peers.



After all money had been counted a staggering £725 had been raised, which has now been sent off to Wear it Pink.

Olympic Day Out

Due to a successful Ormiston Denes trip last year to The Olympic Park, Stratford, London, we decided to return for another year. Our year 9 and 10 V Cert Health and Fitness students were afforded the opportunity to take part in the trip. This consisted of 41 students and three members of staff. The trip included time spent within the NEC Wheelchair Tennis Masters event where they watched a wheelchair tennis game starring a previous world number one player.

After being inspired by the tennis the students were allowed in the tennis activity zone where they tested their co-ordination and reaction time during some tennis, full and mini games, and activities.

After lunch the students were given a tour of the Olympic Stadium where they saw world class

venues such as the Olympic Stadium, the Velodrome and the Copper Box Arena.



Mrs Sutton, Teacher of PE, said: "It is a fantastic way to keep London 2012 alive and continue to 'inspire a generation'. It is a trip we hope to make an annual event due to the benefits to all students and staff involved."

Creative Choices at DanceEast Ipswich

We were offered the opportunity to take students to a "Creative Choices" careers event at DanceEast in Ipswich. During November, staff travelled to Ipswich and accompanied students for this full-on day. DanceEast is a centre for advanced training in dance and is one of the few specialist dance houses in the country - so for our students to be able to take part in this it was very special.

See their website for more information: https://ccskills.org.uk/careers/advice We took our year 10 dance students who took part in four workshops throughout the day. We were told that for every dancer on the stage, there are 13 people who are employed in supportive roles.

The workshops were built around a performance involving looking at the technical aspects of a performance, how a show is produced, front of house roles and marketing and communications. Our dance students had to take an active part and get involved with challenges such as "What do you do when there is a power cut?" "You are out with a performer, who is on stilts and the performer falls over. What do you do?" They had to design a box office and work out who different communications should be shared with. Students got to find out more about the technical aspects of theatre by trying out lighting and sound controls.

Our students enjoyed the day and have asked us to get involved in more activities like his. From



the point of view of the staff, we were able to find out more about careers in the creative industries - the website above has an "ask the expert" feature to enable students to ask specific questions to the right person. This is especially important for us here in Lowestoft where it may not be easy to access specific resources. Staff were able to network and share ideas with other schools' staff.

There are future developments planned with our local theatre who are hoping to offer a similar experience here in Lowestoft. Watch this space!


assembly hall.

Lego League


