From Our Vice Principal, Mr Tony Bown ...

Autumn is always a long term at schools, and as we see a smattering of snow and approach the Christmas break, this is an opportunity for all of us to reflect on what has been taking place in and around Ormiston Denes Academy, a term after we celebrated our best results ever, to ensure that our improvement is sustained.

Reading the following pages you will see a sample of the range of opportunities we offer our students in music, languages, sport, the arts generally and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). I would like to publicly thank the staff who make these opportunities possible. They, like me, understand the importance of broadening horizons and opening minds by exposing young people to activities and opportunities beyond the traditional academic curriculum. I have written in previous issues about our Enrichment Charter, our promise to our students, and I fully acknowledge that we would be unable to deliver it without the professionalism and dedication of our staff.

You will have heard on the news recently the renewed focus the government is putting on social mobility. The aim of this work is to ensure that all young people, regardless of background, are able to achieve the standards required for whichever route is appropriate. Students should have guidance and support to help them make choices that are best for them. This includes Lowestoft students aiming for universities, apprenticeships, or employment at the highest level.

Ormiston Denes Academy has secured funding to support this process. Public Sector Partners in Suffolk are supporting work including STEM-focused activities, under our newly appointed Director of STEM (watch out for our STEM evening in the summer), a renewed focus on high quality careers education, information, advice and guidance and specific focuses on improving attendance and literacy across the academy.

Attendance, as supported by research and our own data, is crucial to success in schools. Indisputably, students who attend Ormiston Denes Academy regularly achieve better academic success. Of course, they also have better access to the range of enrichment opportunities on offer. My plea to parents and to students is to encourage perfect attendance and excellent punctuality to the academy all through the year. We have aspirational targets for attendance and, by their own admission, students do sometimes have time at home which is not strictly necessary.

Kofi Annan, when he was Secretary General of the United Nations, said, "*Literacy is...the road to human progress and the means through which every man, woman and child can realise his or her full potential*". When in polite company, I discuss literacy, correct spellings, or insist on correct grammar. My wife justifiably calls me pedantic, and takes pride in reminding me that the word pedant is borrowed from the French "pédant", meaning teacher or schoolmaster. If, however, I define being 'literate' as being able to read and understand a passage, and being able to explain thoughts clearly in writing or in speech, few would argue that these are important skills. In fact, every GCSE examination assesses student literacy and the literacy skills needed to apply for a job or a college place, and pass an interview, are certainly as important as the academic grades that a student achieves. Our success in the Lowestoft Flood Risk Management Project (page 6) was, in part, because students gave a superb presentation to the judging panel. My second plea to parents and students, therefore, is to use some time over the forthcoming holiday to talk, to have discussions over a meal or while going for a walk and to read - to read anything - as often as possible. If you are short of an idea for a Christmas present, head to Waterstones in Lowestoft and buy a book token.

My final thought goes to Year 11 students. They have impressed us this term with their attitudes to learning, their focus in lessons, and their regular attendance to a longer school day, as we have introduced daily 'period 5' lessons. Their Christmas break will be followed by two weeks of mock examinations. Indeed, for many, the exams have already started. I remind them that, as I explained in my recent '*Make It Happen'* assembly, understanding your own goals and working tirelessly towards achieving those goals, is rewarding. Please make the best of the Christmas break, enjoy some family time, some friend time, some 'down time' and some 'me time', but remember that January is mock season and that if you are in Year 11, you are more than half way through your school year already.

I wish all members of our local community a peaceful, happy Christmas.

Students from Years 8 and 9 had the opportunity to attend a one-off Science Extravaganza at Saint Felix School in Southwold on Thursday 30th November 2017, brought to Suffolk by Cheltenham Science Festival and EDF Energy.

Students watched two really interactive presentations. The first "Hack your Brain" looked at how our brain communicates with the rest of our body, delivered by Ginny Smith, a specialist in Psychology and Neuroscience at the University of Cambridge. The second, "The Wonderful World of Robots" looks at both the history and the future of robots, what they do and how they work, and was delivered by science communicator, Jonathan Milton. The students thoroughly enjoyed their afternoon, especially being able to join in with the performances.

Evie said of the "Hack your Brain" performance "We had a great time learning about the human brain and looking at the illusions, they were really cool." Abbie, who enjoyed the robotics workshop said " I enjoyed controlling the Sphero robot as it was very hard to control but I made it jump which I found pretty cool."

Ormiston Denes Academy Celebrates Second Award of the Year



Our students and staff are celebrating after achieving a second prestigious award, further marking their remarkable year.

Our academy, which is sponsored by Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT), received the award for 'Enterprise in Education' at the Suffolk Chamber of Commerce Awards, which was hosted on the 10th November at the Ivy House Country Hotel, Oulton Broad.

This follows our academy winning the Education Star Award in October at the 'Stars of Lowestoft and Waveney Awards', for achieving our best ever GCSE results this year.

The 'Enterprise in Education' award aims to recognise schools that demonstrate excellence in developing the skills of their students, helping them to be successful in the workplace. Our academy was awarded the title of 'Enterprise in Education' for

demonstrating that it goes beyond classroom learning to enhance, enrich, and embed links with business, and for creatively supporting students to relate their learning to the real world of work.

Ormiston Denes Academy has a number of measures in place to ensure students are well prepared for the world of work or further education. Initiatives include providing careers education, which begins in Year 7; all students having access to a qualified careers guidance professional for one-to-one sessions to help them plan for their future; and all Year 10 students receiving a week of valuable work experience, helping them to develop key skills required to succeed.

Students at the academy also have opportunities to attend trips to the Big Bang Fair (the UK's largest fair for science & engineering for young people), the Suffolk Skills Show, and top universities such as The University of Cambridge and The University of East Anglia (UEA). The academy's close partnership with The UEA and The University of Suffolk brings Higher Education Champions into the academy each week to raise students' aspiration.

In 2017, over 98% of Ormiston Denes Academy's students progressed to further education, training or apprenticeships. The Suffolk Chamber of Commerce awards highlight talent, excellence and inspiration in Lowestoft and Waveney. Ormiston Denes Academy's award was collected by Mr Tony Bown, Vice Principal, and Mrs Carole Budgen, Careers Co-ordinator. Mrs Budgen said: "Our students' futures are at the heart of everything we do and I'm delighted that our academy has won this award. We forge close links with employers and education providers, with over 45 providers attending our annual careers fair and regularly coming to the academy to deliver presentations and workshops to support the curriculum".

Mr Bown said: "I'm absolutely delighted that we have won this award. It builds on the excellent progress we have made this year in other areas, such as achieving our best ever GCSE results. Everyone at our academy works very hard to ensure students are well prepared for the world of work or further education and this award is so well deserved."

Additionally, Ormiston Denes Academy was named as the highly commended finalist in the Community Pride Award, sponsored by Waveney Norse. We would like to congratulate Hoseasons, who were named category winners.

Careers Events This Half Term

Year 9 and 10 students attended the Skills for Energy event at International Aviation Academy in Norwich in November 2017, and explored the range of career and training opportunities available within the energy sector by talking to stallholders. They tested their skills on a tractor simulator from Easton and Otley College and tried out survival equipment with Survitec Group, as well as other interactive activities on offer. In a workshop, students were challenged to build a North Sea rig using spaghetti and marshmallows. Zeta, Year 10, said: "The trip was really useful and helped me to know what kind of jobs there are in energy, and what they involve." Our thanks go to EEEGR for organising an interesting and comprehensive careers event.





Deputy Conservation Warden, Ellen Shales, came for a 'Pizza Careers' working lunch and students learnt about her job at Suffolk Wildlife Trust. She explained about managing habitats to suit the different species of animals, birds and insects at Carlton Marshes. She talked about studying environmental science at university and doing voluntary experience in order to get her dream job.

Police Cyber Crime Investigators came to talk about working for the Police. Students were already well informed about cyber crime as they had attended an assembly by the team recently, but they had lots of questions about the skills needed to work in this area and what the job entails. We learned that there are different routes into this career but increasingly, applicants are expected to have a university degree.

Inter-School Takeover Challenge Event



Nine students from Ormiston Denes Academy, supervised by 2 support staff members, recently participated in an Inter-School Takeover Challenge event. This is a fun, hugely successful and exciting activity for young people that sees organisations across England opening their doors to children and young people to take over adult roles, putting young people into decision making positions and encourages organisations and businesses to hear their views. Children gain an insight into the adult world and organisations benefit from a fresh perspective on their work.

The academy has taken part in Takeover Challenge for a number of years, which is annually supported by our local council and Waveney Youth Council.

This years' challenge was working with our local Lowestoft Flood Risk Management Project (FRMP), in conjunction with the local council. This project is one of the most important projects happening in Lowestoft at the moment, a town that suffered severe flooding in the 1953 & 2013 storms. One of the challenges that the project team faces is communicating with local people of all ages in an engaging and interesting way. The team asked schools to come up with their own proposal on how they could engage people, from all different age groups, about the project: what campaign they would come up with, who and how they would involve people, and by using what medium. The teams also had to decide a team name, and appropriate hashtag.

The project was funded by Lowestoft FRMP & sponsored by local business Lings Motorgroup. Lings suffered over £3.5 million damage in 2013. Our students worked really hard, meeting in the week leading up to the event to do some research prior to the day. They had decided that a logo would be beneficial, so that everybody would instantly recognise something linked to the project. They used a shared Google document so that each team member could share their own thoughts, which prepared them for the day itself.

Our students worked very well on the day, not only creating a campaign plan, hashtag and logo, but also leaflets and other merchandise. They also had to prepare a five minute presentation to present to the judges, and then answer questions about their campaign. After a tense afternoon of judging, our team was awarded for their great efforts by being judged as the winning project. Their prizes were certificates, a glass trophy and a cheque for £2,500 to spend on filming equipment for the academy. These were presented to them by our local MP Peter Aldous, who was also one of the judges. The prizes also include our students working alongside the FRMP to make their idea a reality, and continue to do so up until the project completion in 2020.

JB, a Year 9 student, said: "The experience of taking part was great; the quietness in the boardroom was intense; the laughter as we took part was fun and we learnt so much about flooding and also about each other. When we found out that we had won, I just wanted to shout *yessss*! The pride you feel for your team is huge."

Ms Mayo, Transition and Co-Curriculum Projects Manager said: "This has been a great project to work on, allowing the organisers to see things from a different perspective and listening to the views and ideas of young people. It has given students an insight into the world of work, and enhanced their enterprise skills. It brought a group of students together to work for a common goal, and one that will give a legacy to the Lowestoft community. Being project winners means that these students will work to see their ideas come to fruition to raise awareness of the Flood Risk Management Project."

In light of the opening of Ormiston Denes' German Department, the MFL department took part in a German film screening at Cinema City, Norwich, on Thursday 19th October.

The screening was organised by The UEA Think German Network and offered Year 8 and 9 students across Suffolk and Norfolk the opportunity to watch "Der Ganz Großer Traum" (lessons of a dream) with English subtitles.

A coach left the academy at 9.00am with 20 excited Year 9 German students on board and headed for Norwich. Their behaviour was impeccable throughout the duration of the journey, and they were encouraged to speak in the target language.

On arrival at Cinema City, students and teachers were provided with drinks and snacks before entering the cinema screen. The students thoroughly enjoyed the gripping film (in German!) which was based on real events and tells the story of a visionary young teacher who not only changed his students' lives but also introduced the game of football to Germany.



The event, which was funded by the German Embassy and The UEA, was accompanied by a quiz and creative writing competition for schools to take back with them.

Courtney, Year 9, attended the trip and said: "It was an enjoyable experience. It taught me a lot about life in Germany during that period of time, and I also learnt some more German vocab. Overall, it was a really good trip."

Embrace Film Screening

This annual event brings together employers, schools, colleges and training providers. It offers students the chance to work out which careers are of interest to them, match their strengths, then find out the best route to get the right skills for the job.



There were a wide breadth of sectors being promoted at the show, including advanced manufacturing, agriculture, food and science, creative and digital industries, construction, energy, retail, financial, HM Forces, horticulture, law and legal services, to name but a few.

Students were able to tour the vast exhibition stands,

speak to employers and training providers, and find out more about careers they may have a future interest in, or indeed that they had not even considered. They were also able to find out not only what qualifications may be required, but also the 'softer' employability skills that employers are also looking for in their ideal employee.

Our students came back from the trip enthused about all that they had seen, heard and learnt from the various employers and training providers.



<u>Children in Need</u> 17th November 2017

Students celebrated Children in Need with a number of different, and some new, events in the academy. Although we didn't have the normal non-school uniform day, we did host a

bake sale during break time, together with duck racing at lunchtime in our assembly hall. Students were also invited to bring in their teddies, in conjunction with BBC Radio Suffolk.

Year 10 Work Experience Monday 2nd - Friday 6th July 2018

- Work experience gives young people the opportunity for involvement in a workplace, helping them to understand how the world of work operates and how it differs to school. For many students this will be their first chance to work in an adult working environment, and an opportunity to show their potential. It can increase confidence, further develop employability skills and bring the curriculum to life by showing how subjects can be applied and valued in the workplace.
- Year 10 students have received their work experience application packs, and the completed application forms should be handed back to tutors by **Friday 12th January 2018.**
- Please support your child with their work experience applications and discuss the various options available, including 'Find Your Own' work placements, which helps to ensure students have a placement of their choice.
- We would recommend that students consider finding their own placement, in order to meet their specific choice and needs and to ensure a placement that they will be successful in. Students have until 17th March 2017 to be able to find their own placements, using the peach forms which were in their launch packs.
- Any queries relating to work experience can be forwarded to Ms Mayo at the academy.

U13 Football - CSF EFL Cup

On 5th December the U13 Girls spent the day at Carrow Park in Norwich, taking part in the U13 Community Sports Foundation English Football League 6-a-side cup. This was a great experience for the girls, both on and off the pitch.

Year 7 students experienced a fantastic visit on Thursday 30th November to the UEA. 28 boys had the chance to spend the day at the Sportspark and then were taken into the lab for sports science research. The sports were archery, judo, fencing and rock climbing on the amazing indoor climbing wall.

Students experienced two of the four sports, all with qualified coaches and state of the art equipment. In the afternoon the boys attended two sessions in the lab; one on healthy eating and the other on the effects of energy drinks.

Students concluded the day with a tour of the facilities, including lecture halls, dining areas and accommodation.

The reason behind the trip is that the amount of boys applying to universities is falling nationally and it is hoped by providing such a fantastic experience during Year 7, students will set themselves high aspirations for further education.
