Regional Student Voice

Regional Student Voice is a student council over all the schools in the OAT trust. We had been asked to go to our separate academies to decide on a project based on either environmental help or equality and diversity. Members of student council had decided on equality and diversity and ideas had included having a culture day to celebrate, as week commencing 20th March was a week within our academy in which we celebrated diversity. This meant all teachers and students embraced other cultures and celebrated their own. We decided to display this by sending a spreadsheet out to all our teachers that, if they wished, they could fill out with their nationalities, religion (if they have one) and their favourite food from their nationality. With these details, we plan to create a PowerPoint template that teachers can place on their classroom doors if they wish, to display their culture.
