DORA LOVE

A team of year 9 students visited Suffolk University (Ipswich) for a day of workshops on the holocaust. This was preparation for a competition to raise awareness about intolerance in the past and today. As well as learning history, students were given training on how to present information in creative ways.

The Year 9 team will combine their research and presentation skills to present on the theme of 'The Fragility of Freedom.' They will then showcase their work alongside other schools from the East of England. The school judged to have put together the best presentation will be awarded the Dora Love Prize. This prestigious award is presented by the University of Essex. It is named in honour after a holocaust survivor who settled in England after the war and campaigned dedicated her life to promoting respect and tolerance.



Climate Action. Students have been working on a climate action project with our NEACO access and participation officer. The project aim is to increase

communication, speaking and listening skills, and enhance abilities such as confidence, teamwork and leadership. The projects started with a one day Oracy workshop delivered by Talk the Talk. This was followed by four one hour after school workshops exploring climate and environmental issues in



connected with air quality. By the end of the four workshops students had developed a presentation and speech, which they then presented at the final celebration day at Cambridge University.



Future Stars programme

Year 7 students have been involved in the University of East Anglia (UEA) Future Stars programme. The UEA set up this programme to provide young people with the opportunity to explore what universities have to offer, motivating them to aim for higher education. Students had an initial in school workshop, followed by a visit to the university to get a feel for student life as part of their Future Stars Programme. The university visit included a tour of the university, a talk with staff and students, as well as the opportunity to try rock climbing and pickle ball. This was followed by a final workshop in the academy, where students completed their booklets and received a participation medal and certificate.



A HUGE WELL DONE to **Nevaeh** who competed in this year's academic **The Great Debate** organised by the Historical Association. Students had to prepare and deliver a five minute presentation based on a historical place or person from the local area who they feel deserves great recognition. Nevaeh, the youngest competitor in the competition, gave a wonderful presentation about Robert Hook, a historical coxswain of the RNLI Lowestoft Lifeboat, who was credited with saving over six hundred lives. **Nevaeh** was highly credited for her research, presentation and public speaking skills, and all the judges spoke very highly of her. Of course everyone back at the academy were also extremely proud of her achievement.



WHICH HISTORICAL PLACE OR PERSON FROM YOUR LOCAL AREA DESERVES GREATER RECOGNITION?

Our thanks to **Olivia who** represented ODA at the **Lowestoft Holocaust Memorial Day** service. The service was held at Lowestoft Train Station, significant as this was a station which received over five hundred young people as part of the Kinder Transport in December1938. Holocaust Memorial Day is a national commemoration

day in the United Kingdom dedicated to the remembrance of the jews and others who suffered in the Holocaust under Nazi persecution. The theme for this year was Fragility of Freedom and **Olivia** wrote and presented her own poignant and moving speech around this theme during the course of the service. She also laid a wreath to commemorate the day.

In school, assemblies were also delivered to all students, as part of the commemorations.



HOT OFF THE PRESS: Lidl and Ormiston Denes Academy join forces for cooking



We teamed up with Lidl to deliver cooking lessons through their Ingredients into Schools project.

These lessons are part of a pilot supported by the Agriculture and Horticulture Development Board and the British Nutrition Foundation.

The academy's aspiring chefs have been learning to prepare orange glazed one-pan pork or veggie dishes using ingredients donated by the supermarket chain.

As well as teaching culinary skills, these lessons are helping the students increase their kitchen confidence.

The initiative also involves working with farmers, thus supporting the British farming industry by helping to share high-quality and nutritious foods with young people. The aim is to help students not only develop a love for cooking but also gain knowledge about balanced, nutritious meals.

Principal at Ormiston Denes Academy, Kate Williams said: "It has been excellent to see our students get really stuck into and inspired by cooking, learning more about the important skills and knowledge that goes into preparing a healthy, balanced meal and creating some delicious food at the same time.

Learning cooking skills at school is an integral part of young people's food education. However, the expense of providing the ingredients can present a barrier due to rising cost. This project has been developed to ensure students develop practical food skills and gain cooking confidence. It will empower them to make informed choices about healthy eating habits and participate in activities that might otherwise be financially challenging.

60 pupils from years 8,9 and 10 took part in these lessons over the last fortnight in which they made crumpets and butter. In doing this the student learnt new ways in using these ingredients and how science and cookery are linked, for example – how are the holes created in a crumpet?
