National Youth Take Over

East Suffolk Council invited a small group of students to participate in National Youth Takeover Day, which gives young people an opportunity to take ownership of an issue that is at the forefront of people's lives today. Our team comprised of year 7 students Harry and Harrison, Alex in year 8, and Bethany, Xander, Ella and Charlie in year 10.

Along with four other schools the teams had to create a project and build a campaign to tackle the theme, dealing with the rising costs in our community. The winning team would be awarded supported in getting their project up and running.

Our students decided the best way to support understanding of the cost of living issue was to further raise awareness of budgeting. Their idea included inviting industry professionals and other stakeholders in for a meeting, and to create a workshop with resources which could be piloted in our own school and disseminated out to other schools. They felt it also important to take this support into the primary schools, so students became more aware of budgeting needs from an early age. Our students were super proud to find out that they were the winning team!! We look forward to them moving this idea forward, with the support of the academy and external partners.



Year 10 Careers Day

Students in Year 10 were invited to a Careers Aspiration Day organised by The Norfolk and Suffolk Careers Hub.

Students were able to engage with many employers who were showcasing local pathways and opportunities to engage students about careers within the energy sector, health care and the visitor economy. Through interactive opportunities

and discussions students were able to receive realistic careers advice and learn about the various routes into employment. In additional to the 'market stall' arena there were a number of 'spotlight' talks providing more targeted information to students about different sector roles.

Our students made the most of this opportunity and were engaged in great conversations to support their future pathways. about job roles that they had never heard of, which was wonderful for them.




Anti Bullying Week at Ormiston Denes Academy

East Suffolk Council / Ormiston Denes Academy

East Suffolk Youth Council invited our students to join a new team of young people from across East Suffolk to ensure the voices and concerns of young people are heard. We held an election to appoint two students to attend on our behalf, and following a turnout of 164 votes, **Harrison & Jemima** were chosen to represent our students for the next two years.

Harrison & Jemima joined 30 other members of the Youth Council at East Suffolk House who were 'sworn in' as councillors. Later, Harrison and Jemima attended the first official meeting of East Suffolk Youth Council and wrote the following;

First on the agenda was the election of a Chair and Vice Chair for future council sessions, and we congratulated the successful candidates. We also heard an update from members of East Suffolk Council, who confirmed that the constitution has been amended so that any motion we pass must be discussed by the local council itself. The Youth Council then discussed the motion that we collectively wrote at our induction day, which was focused on the topic of Youth Support and Safety. First, we voted on a proposed amendment which sought to remove a clause calling on the council to produce youth mental health booklets. We voted against the amendment, which was defeated. Next we voted on the overall amendment, which calls for greater support and awareness of mental health issues affecting young people. The motion was passed unanimously. We are delighted that the motion passed and hope that it achieves it aims of raising awareness in our community.

Councillor Harry: I then spoke about the importance of litter-picking and proposed an idea that there should be more litter picks in our town and along the beach. This was an important issue to me because we need to do more to help the environment and save the

planet. I see a lot of litter in our local area and know that this is important to the people on the council. Other councillors supported my proposal and have offered to write a motion for discussion at our next meeting.

Councillor Jemima: I proposed that we should explore disability awareness and support in more detail. I feel that lots of young people lack awareness of a range of disabilities and the difficulties that they bring, and therefore I would like there to be more education around this. I have therefore decided to work with my fellow councillors to write a motion and bring this forward at our next meeting.
